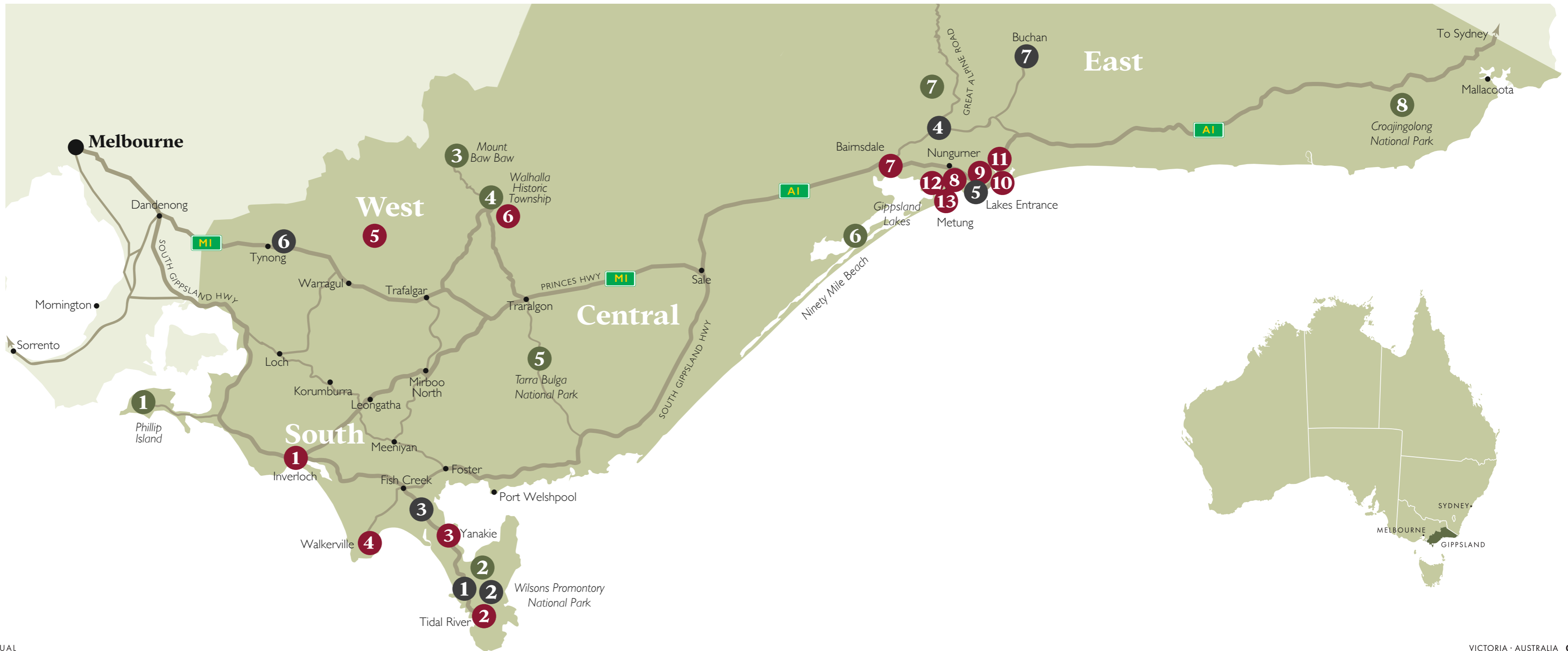

BE INSPIRED BY Gippsland

Gippsland is a diverse region located to the east of Melbourne, stretching all the way to the New South Wales border.

The region is known for expansive coastline and the Gippsland Lakes, Wilsons Promontory National Park and a cluster of charming villages, including Walthalla, Loch and Metung. It's also known for great food and wine, and a chance to see wildlife in the wild.

Gippsland offers an iconic coastal itinerary to self-drive between Sydney and Melbourne.



Wildlife, in the Wild

Kangaroos, wallabies, wombats, emus, koalas, possums and echidnas are all commonly sighted Australian animals found in Gippsland.

Wilson's Promontory National Park, just three hours' drive from Melbourne is a haven for Australian wildlife. Visit at dawn or dusk to take advantage of native animal viewing times at The Prom, as they forage for food. Offshore, there is a permanent seal colony at Kanowna Island, and little penguins are often spotted feeding at sea. Dolphins abound and at certain times of the year, southern right and humpback whales are often spotted.

The Gippsland Lakes in the east abound with native birds and at Croajingolong National Park, over 280 species of birds co-exist. Raymond Island, just off Paynesville is home to a large koala colony and is the best place in Victoria to see koalas in the wild.

Gippsland's Lakes & Coast

With over 600km of coastline, Gippsland is spoilt with its choice of beaches. The Gippsland Lakes provide a water-lover's sanctuary as the largest inland waterway in Australia.

From the beaches of the Bass Coast to Squeaky Beach at Wilsons Prom, and beyond to Ninety Mile Beach - one of the longest uninterrupted stretches of beaches in the world, Gippsland is a favourite for beach dwellers. Croajingolong National Park near Mallacoota encompasses 100km of coast and hinterland where lush rainforest gives way to rambling heathland and white sandy beaches.

The Gippsland Lakes provide the ultimate water playground for visitors. Stretching over 400 square kilometres the Gippsland Lakes offer secluded inlets, tranquil rivers and sheltered anchorages all year round. Visitors swim, sail, boat, kayak, fish and stand-up paddle board in its sheltered waterways.

Gippsland Food & Drink

Gippsland is home to one of Australia's emerging food and wine destinations. The region produces an impressive array of premium, cool climate wines, quality cheeses, free range meats and organic fruit and vegetables. The region also produces much of the fresh fish and seafood served up in Melbourne eateries.

Gippsland is home to an emerging set of dining and drinking experiences worth the drive. In East Gippsland, Sardine Eatery + Bar and The Long Paddock source produce from local farmers and growers and are developing a growing list of fans who drive from Melbourne to sample the weekend menu.



GIPPSLAND EXPERIENCES

East Gippsland

The East Gippsland region is abundant with visitor experiences.

Few places in the world offer the diverse waterways and fishing opportunities of the Gippsland Lakes. Learn how to sail, stand-up paddle board or kayak or take to the ocean from a deep sea fishing charter.

Eleven world class national, coastal and marine parks and reserves are here to explore. Croajingolong National Park cocoons a diversity of natural environments, and the Buchan Caves Reserve delivers beautiful calcite-rimmed pools in the Royal and Fairy Caves.



The Gippsland Lakes & Croajingolong National Park

The Gippsland Lakes offer the perfect boating destination, offering secluded inlets and sheltered anchorages year round. Local boat hire businesses teach visitors how to operate a yacht or cruiser, no licence required.

Fishing in the region is a limitless adventure, with a long list of fish and crustaceans on offer. Enjoy a guided fishing tour of the lakes or take to the open water in search of some really big fins.

Croajingolong National Park is one of Australia's last true wilderness regions, hugging the coast for 100km north of the lakes region and home to estuaries, heathland, rocky beaches and tall forests. This translates to great bushwalking, bird and wildlife watching and stunning landscapes and sunsets for visitors driving the Sydney-Melbourne touring route.

The Great Alpine Road & East Gippsland Villages

From the top of Victoria to the Gippsland Lakes, the Great Alpine Road is a stunning diversion from the main highway heading north or south. From pretty Bruthen, head north through Swifts Creek and historic Omeo, taking in crystal clear rivers, old gold huts and the odd winery and olive grove, towards the High Country.

Bairnsdale is a thriving central town, with some great eateries and shops, while the lakeside villages of Metung, Paynesville and Lakes Entrance hug the water's edge, the perfect launch spot for so many activities. Marlo and Mallacoota are home to magnificent estuaries and Instagrammable backdrops. Inland, Bruthen, Buchan and Omeo are full of local colour.

Food & Drink

East Gippsland offers a bounty of fresh local produce, be it freshly caught, raised on green pastures or created in the kitchens of local artisan producers. Colourful local beer producers, breathtaking cellar door backdrops and cool climate wines ensure visitors to the region don't go hungry.

South Gippsland

South Gippsland, often referred to locally as Prom Country, is a leisurely two-hour drive south east of Melbourne.

The region is renowned for its spectacular scenery, unspoilt beaches, towering forests and farm fresh produce. A nature-lover's paradise, Prom Country is home to Wilsons Promontory National Park and is a highlight of the Sydney-Melbourne touring route. It is undoubtedly the hero of South Gippsland and a must see destination.



Wilsons Promontory National Park

Wilsons Promontory National Park is Victoria's largest wilderness coastal landscape and Australia's southern most mainland destination. Affectionately known as "The Prom", it is a 50 000 hectare nature reserve threaded with a labyrinth of walking tracks. Home to tranquil rivers, intimate coves, granite mountaintops and lush forested valleys, The Prom also hosts an array of secluded beaches.

The Prom is a refuge for an array of native wildlife including kangaroos, emus, wombats, echidnas and koalas. Visitors are encouraged to stay overnight as the best wildlife viewing times are dawn and dusk when the animals feed. The birdlife is also prolific. Crimson rosellas, gold whistlers and yellow tailed black cockatoo are all visible here.

Overnight options are available at Tidal River in the Wilderness Retreats and Limosa Rise, which is located just outside The Prom. Campers are spoiled for choice with a number of campsites at Tidal River or at locations on overnight hikes throughout The Prom.

Villages

The region is host to a number of charming villages and towns, bursting with colour and country hospitality. Coastal towns of Sandy Point, Waratah Bay, Walkerville and Venus Bay are home to some of the most beautiful beaches in Victoria. Swim, paddle or surf, or simply grab a towel and relax on the beach. Try your hand at fishing at one of the great fishing spots, including Tarwin Lower.

The towns of Nyora, Poowong, Loch, Korumburra, Leongatha, Koonwarra, Mirboo North and Meeniyan are nestled amongst the rolling green hills, each with their own distinct charm. Discover what each has to offer.

Food & Drink

South Gippsland is home to some of Victoria's freshest and tastiest produce. Tantalise your tastebuds at one of the many cafés, pubs or restaurants throughout the region. Purchase goods from a retail outlet or a monthly farmers market. The region boasts wineries producing cool-climate Pinot Noir and quality whites. Scattered throughout the region are boutique breweries, distilleries and a cidery which has magnificent views overlooking The Prom.



Arts & Crafts

Many artists and craftspeople have chosen to make Prom Country their home, creating a vibrant arts community. Throughout the region there is a wide variety of galleries and several stores featuring quality products from local artists and craftspeople.

Central Gippsland

Located just over two hours from Melbourne, the Central Gippsland region offers abundant opportunities to delve into authentic and local Australian experiences, as part of the Sydney-Melbourne Coastal drive.

The region includes the High Country villages of Dargo and Licola, and one of the world's longest beaches, the aptly named Ninety Mile Beach.

A must-do experience in Central Gippsland is to walk across the suspension bridge through the rainforest canopy at Tarra Bulga National Park. The rainforest, giant ash and myrtle beech are all easily accessible via short strolls through the scenic park.

Central Gippsland's idyllic Australian landscape make it the perfect off-highway alternative on the Sydney-Melbourne touring route. Stop and cycle a section of the Gippsland Plains Rail Trail, sip and swirl at a winery, experience a proper country pub meal, or bushwalk the Freestone Creek and the beautifully scenic Blue Pool.

Sydney Melbourne Coastal Drive

Moving along the Sydney Melbourne Coastal Drive, the landscape continually changes – from pastoral country scenery, to coastal views, to unspoiled wilderness.

Hire a boat or kayak to explore the coastal villages and waterways of the Gippsland Lakes. Discover Wilsons Promontory and explore bays, observe wildlife in natural habitat, or hike overnight to an historic lighthouse.

Day 1: Depart from Sydney and make your way down to Narooma or Bermagui for your first night. Sample local oysters and hospitality and take in coastal views.

Day 2: Travel south via coastal towns and vistas, then cross the border into Gippsland. Just south of the border lies Mallacoota, which is surrounded by Croajingolong National Park and gives access to extensive waterways. Explore walking trails and Gabo Island's historic lighthouse. Depart Mallacoota and head to the Gippsland Lakes. Accommodation is available at Mallacoota, Metung, and Lakes Entrance.

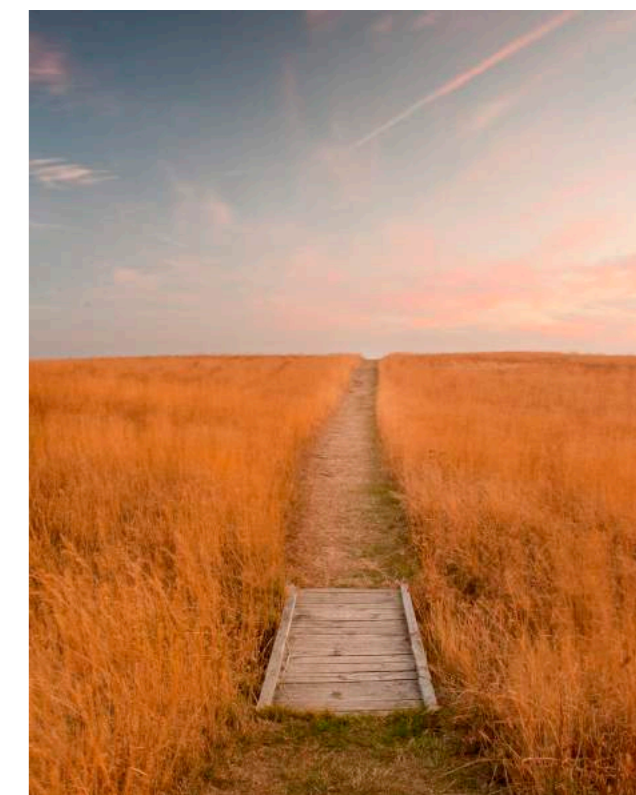
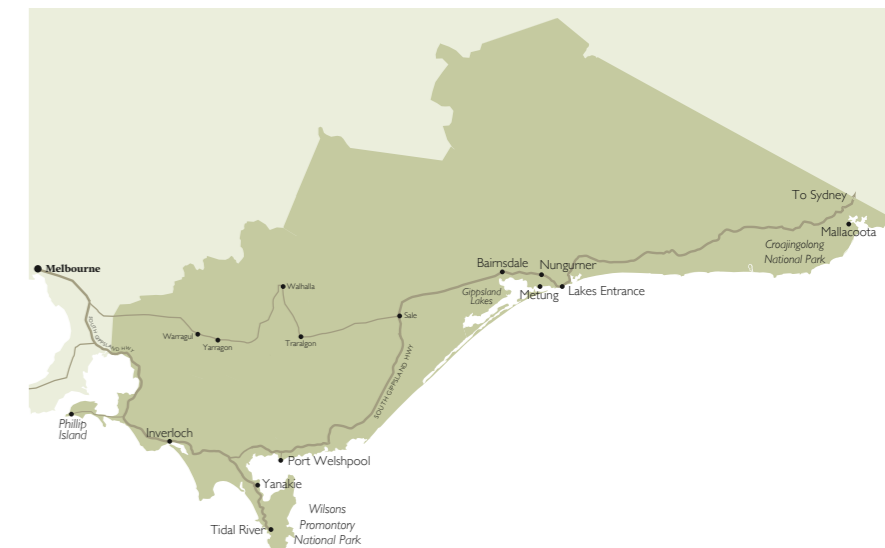
Day 3: Spend the day discovering waterways. Explore hamlets, coastline and river systems as you travel. Sample local seafood and observe the sea and bird life. Raymond Island, a short ferry ride away from Paynesville, has a koala population. Accommodation is available in nearby Bairnsdale.

Day 4: Travel through Gippsland's farmland before stopping in Sale to explore wetlands, gardens and galleries. Pass through the villages of Yarram and Foster before arriving at Wilsons Promontory. Walk through bushland and beaches, or simply enjoy the coastal views and wildlife. Accommodation is available at Tidal River or Yanakie.

Day 5: Spend the day exploring the national park, hike to discover beaches or climb to the top of Mt Oberon to take in the view.

Day 6: Depart Wilsons Promontory and head to Port Welshpool to join one of two cruise operators on a marine tour down the eastern side of Wilsons Promontory. The tour visits Kanowna Seal Colony and Skull Rock and offers abundant chance to observe wildlife. Drive to Inverloch and stay overnight at the RACV Inverloch Resort.

Day 7: Spend the morning discovering Inverloch, taking the 14km Bunurong Coastal Drive for coastal views. Head towards Kilcunda before visiting Phillip Island for the Penguin Parade. Stay overnight here, or head to Melbourne.



West Gippsland

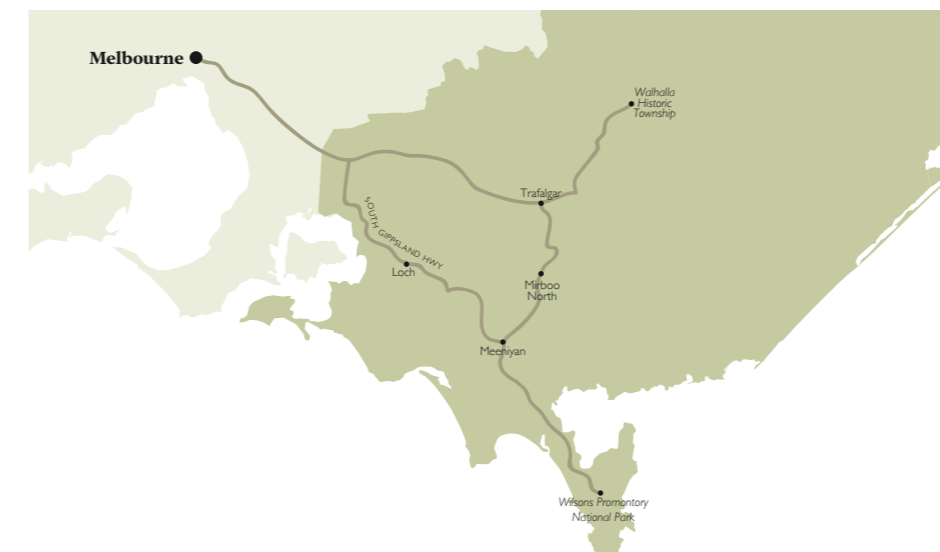
West Gippsland is an easy one hour drive east of Melbourne. The region announces itself with rolling green pastures, nestled between the Baw Baw and Strzelecki Ranges.

Visitors can explore the beauty of Toorong Falls, and stroll across the Noojee Trestle Bridge before continuing to Walhalla and Mt Baw Baw.

Walhalla is steeped in rich gold mining history and is home to only a few residents but there are many things to do including riding the historic Walhalla Goldfields Railway and visiting the Extended Long Tunnel Gold Mine. Walhalla is a must-do stop on the Sydney-Melbourne touring route.

In winter, visitors can take a snow break at Mt Baw Baw Alpine Resort and enjoy some easy skiing, snow play or a Howling Huskies sled tour. The gentle slopes and ski runs are designed with beginners in mind.

Yarragon village offers an eclectic range of shops, galleries and eateries. Visitors here enjoy an array of shopping experiences from art, giftware or retro homewares.



Food, Wine & History

Day 1: Departing Melbourne, leave the Princes Highway at Moe and drive to Walhalla. Discover Walhalla's heritage buildings, take a tour of the Long Tunnel Extended Gold Mine, ride the Walhalla Goldfields Railway over trestle bridges or explore the intriguing cemetery.

Day 2: Drive past mountain views to the Latrobe Valley, then head into the Strzelecki Ranges for a craft beer in Mirboo North. Travel through farmland and stop for a tasting at one of South Gippsland's wineries. Arriving in Wilsons Promontory, walk the beaches and enjoy the water.

Day 3: Spend the day exploring – hike to beaches, climb Mt Oberon and take in the views or sit quietly and observe the wildlife.

Day 4: Depart Wilsons Promontory and have lunch in Meeniyan, where local produce abounds. Stop at Loch to sample and shop for traditional ales, gin and whisky before heading back to Melbourne.



The Gippsland Discovery Route

Day 1: Take the Monash Freeway from Melbourne, stopping at Cannibal Creek Winery for lunch and wine. It's then a short trip to Gumbuya World, where visitors can find wildlife in habitats mimicking the surrounding bush. Continue to Walhalla for historic postcard scenery. Stay overnight at the Walhalla's Star Hotel.

Day 2: Rejoin the Princes Highway and meander through Central Gippsland and its country villages. Stops en route include Blue Pool, Stratford and the Den of Nargun before arriving at the Gippsland Lakes. Accommodation is available in Metung, Lakes Entrance or Nungumer.

Day 3: Spend a day enjoying the Gippsland Lakes. The local villages abound with food, wine and galleries. The waterways offer hire boats, cruisers, kayaks and paddle board to keep you busy. Departing the lakes region, head south, overnighting in Sale.

Day 4: Drive to Port Welshpool to join one of two cruise operators on a journey of wildlife discovery at Wilsons Promontory. Spend the day viewing sea life and enjoy lunch in Refuge Cove. Returning to land, drive to your overnight accommodation in either Wilsons Promontory or the region surrounding Yanakie.

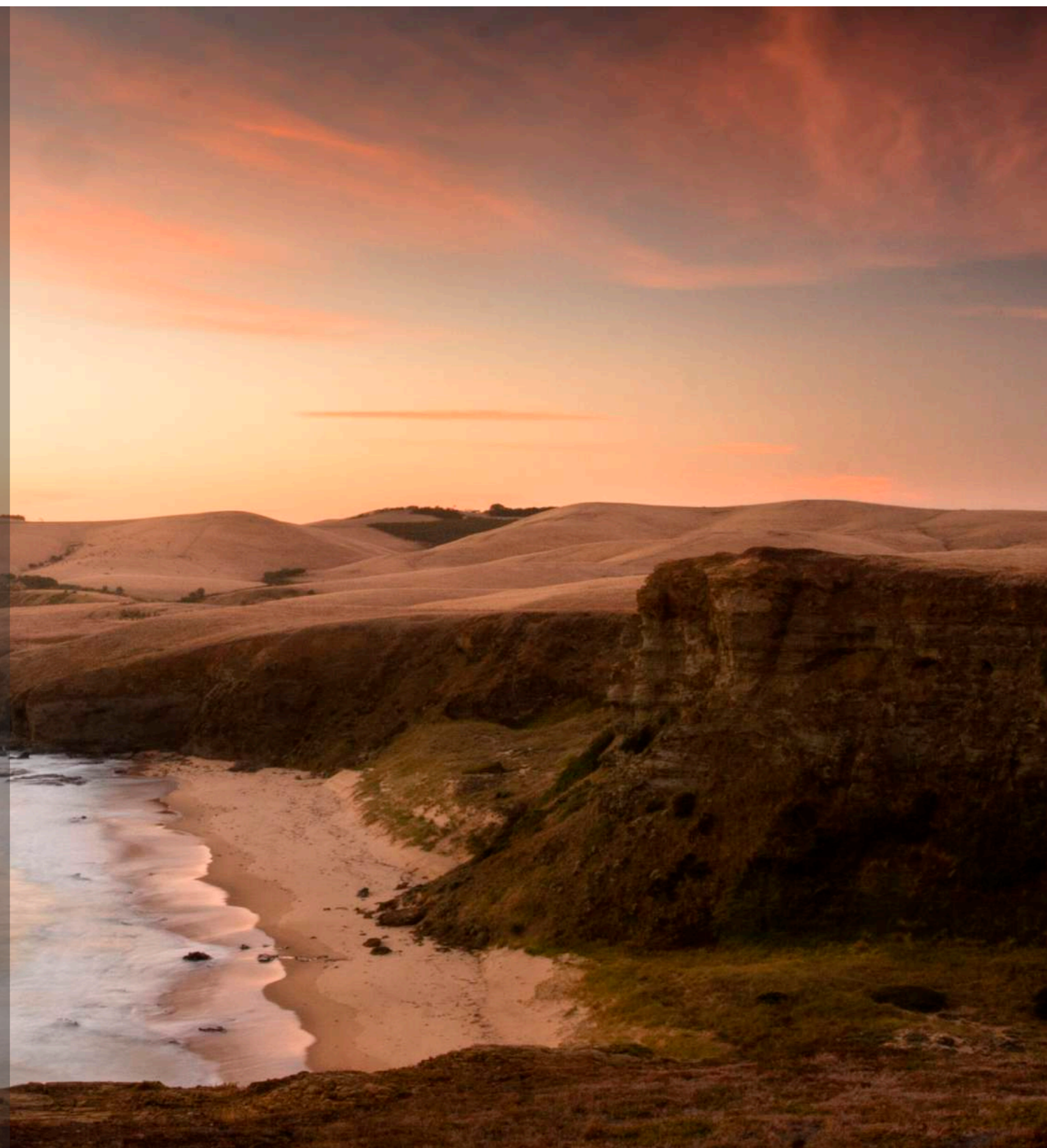
Day 5: Experience The Prom, searching for wildlife and enjoying the waterways. Depart mid-afternoon to make your way back to Melbourne.

Phillip Island & the Bass Coast

Phillip Island, best known for its irresistible nightly Penguin Parade nestles alongside the mainland Gippsland coast in the region known as the Bass Coast. The Bass Coast stretches from San Remo through Kilcunda and on to Wonthaggi and Inverloch.

The George Bass Coastal Walk is a cliff-top trail that stretches from the outskirts of San Remo (just off Phillip Island) along 7km of coastal landscape to Kilcunda. The walk links into the Bass Coast Rail Trail which extends to Wonthaggi.

The Bunurong Coastal Drive offers a series of dramatic beachscapes including Eagle's Nest, and links into the charming seaside town of Inverloch. In winter, the drive offers great opportunities to spot whales from shore on their annual migration. Inverloch offers a great base as visitors travel from the penguins to The Prom.
